dwarf peaches

Dwarf peaches are self pollinating, requiring only one tree.

Cresthaven: Large. Firm, yellow to red skin. Yellow flesh, red around pit. Good for cold climates. Freestone when fully ripe. Sweet, very juicy. Ripens: Late Aug.

Elberta: Large, usually elongated. Skin golden yellow, flushed with red where exposed to sun. Yellow flesh, very rich and sweet. Ripens: Late July to early Aug.

Red Haven: Medium to Large. Red blushed yellow skin. Firm, sweet yellow flesh. Good for cold climates. Freestone when fully ripe. Hangs well on tree when ripe. The #1 commercial peach for canning. Ripens: Late June.

Reliance: Medium. Dull red blush over yellow skin. Firm, yellow flesh. Good flavor. Productive. Beautiful, late bloom. Extremely hardy. Ripens Late June.

plums

Plums are divided into two groups - European and Japanese. Europeans are self pollinators and Japanese require two different varieties to cross pollinate.

Burbank: Japanese, medium. Bright red mottled yellow & yellow skin. Firm, sweet, aromatic, juicy. Tolerate cold. Ripens: Sept.

Italian Prune: European, large, oval. Dark purple skin. Excellent quality, greenish-yellow flesh. Cold hardy and vigorous. SELF FERTILE. Ripens: Aug. into Sept.

Ozark Premier: Japanese, very large. Skin bright red. Flesh yellow, firm, fine grained, juicy, tart. Flavor good. Semi-cling. Cold hardy. Ripens: Early Aug.

Stanley Prune: European, large. Dark blue skin. Flesh greenish-yellow, juicy, fine grained, sweet. High quality. Very productive, reliable. Cold Hardy. SELF FERTILE. Ripens: Aug.

dwarf pears

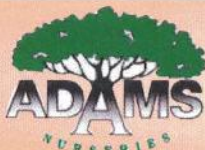
Dwarf pears may be self-fertile, but most will produce more if cross pollinated.

Bartlett: #1 pear in the world. Large. Smooth, waxy yellow skin. White. Sweet flesh. A vigorous grower. SELF-FERTILE, but produces better when planted with d'anjou or Bosc. Ripens: Aug.

Bosc: Large long necked, tapering fruit. Heavy russeting on green or yellow skin. White, juicy flesh with rich, slightly acid flavor. A favorite for eating and cooking. Pollinized by Bartlett or other pears. Sept. to Oct.

Kieffer: Large. Greenish-yellow skin blushed red. Coarse, crisp, juicy with flesh. Stores well. SELF FERTILE. Ripens: Oct. to Nov.

Moonglow: Large. Brownish-green skin. Fruit resembles Bartlett in shape. Soft flesh, moderately juicy and nearly free of grit cells. Flavor mild, sub-acid and rated as good. Very resistant to fireblight. Does better with pollinizer such as Bartlett. A good pollinator for other pears. Ripens: Early Aug.



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
